THE MONELL FOUNDATION—EXPANDING LEARNING THROUGH STUDY ABROAD

The College's Student-Faculty International Fellowship Program, supported by the Ambrose Monell Foundation, sponsors short-term study abroad programs designed to educate students about the world around them through first-hand experiences. While study abroad is common in four-year institutions, it remains unusual in community colleges. Students from the College benefit from opportunities to become immersed in other cultures, study a country's history and discover what life is like around the globe. This past year, Community College of Philadelphia students and faculty went to Mexico, Japan and England.

In 2018, 14 students and three faculty members took advantage of the opportunity to study abroad in Merida, Mexico. The Merida program explored the diversity in the Yucatan area of Mexico with its conjunction of Maya, Spanish-American and modern cosmopolitan cultures.

Ten students visited Japan and traveled to Osaka, Hiroshima, Kyoto, Okayama and Nara. The itinerary featured many of the College's longstanding partnerships, which included the World Friendship Center, the Hiroshima Peace Culture Foundation, the Hiroshima Peace Museum and the Kyoto-based Medieval Studies Institute.

The London program included students from the College's Liberal Arts Honors program and was led by Dr. Sarah lepson, associate professor and chair of Art, and Michael Loughran, assistant professor of English. Students visited the British Museum, National Gallery, Tate Modern and St. Paul's Cathedral. They also climbed the 311 steps to the observation platform of the Great Fire of London monument. The program included day trips to St. Albans and Canterbury, and a visit to Shakespeare's Globe Theatre for a performance of "Two Noble Kinsmen," by John Fletcher and Shakespeare.

The support of the Ambrose Monell Foundation for the Study Abroad program has provided invaluable international experiences for students. It supports the College's efforts to encourage all students to think globally and achieve greater understanding of other cultures.

50TH ANNIVERSARY PROMISE SCHOLARS WELCOME



The College welcomed its newest cohort of 50th Anniversary Promise Scholars in August 2017. In its first three years, the College has assisted more than 700 students. This fundraising initiative enables college-ready, Pelleligible, Philadelphia high school graduates to attend Community College of Philadelphia with no out-of-pocket cost for tuition and fees. The program began in fall 2015 in response to America's College Promise proposal.

PARX CASINO DIVERSITY PARTNERSHIP

Community College of Philadelphia and Parx Casino established a diversity partnership in January 2018 that helped fund support services for students who are veterans, LGBTQ, women and members of underserved communities. The partnership, which includes a gift of \$102,000 from Parx, will empower students to overcome challenges and reach their academic and career goals.

Ron Davis, director of Diversity and Community Affairs at Parx Casino, who frequently takes time from his busy schedule to mentor students at the College, is largely responsible for spearheading this partnership. He is among the growing legion of current and former NFL players who champion social and educational causes in their community. Over the course of decades, he has used the skills he developed on the field to succeed in the highly competitive world of business. His deep-seated belief in the power of teamwork has helped make that possible, particularly within his current capacity with Parx Casino.

"We have a responsibility to share our success with the community. We've done that since we opened our doors in 2006," said Davis. "Corporate responsibility is community responsibility... We're hoping that other corporations join this initiative at some point to help begin a gateway of growth within the [College's] community."

COFFEE FOR A CAUSE HELPS PAVE THE PATH FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

Saxbys recently set out on a new mission to "Make Life Better" one coffee at a time by establishing a scholarship program for Community College of Philadelphia students.

This past year, the grand openings at 1800 Chestnut and 1818 Market streets of two new Saxbys, a locally-based coffee and hospitality company, featured celebrity baristas who welcomed patrons to enjoy coffee for a cause at a "pay-as-you-wish" price, with proceeds benefiting the College.

At the November event, throngs of people crowded the location throughout the day to have orders handed

to them by guest baristas, including Philadelphia Mayor James Kenney, City Councilman Allan Domb, Chris Long and Rodney McLeod of the Philadelphia Eagles, State Representative Jordan Harris, Fox 29 TV Host Quincy Harris, and others.

During the event, Nick Bayer, CEO and founder of Saxbys and a member of the College's Foundation Board, delivered a surprise announcement met with cheers and applause: in addition to Saxbys matching all proceeds from the grand opening for the scholarship, the Maguire Foundation would match the combined total raised. The Maguire Foundation focuses on improving the quality of life through supporting education, the arts and humanities, and fighting hunger and homelessness.

In addition to generating scholarship dollars, Saxbys provides potential employment pathways for students. "Our students not only will have an opportunity to have scholarships, but they also have an opportunity to work here," said Dr. Generals.

This collaborative effort to empower students emphasizes the possibilities that exist at the College.



PAYING IT FORWARD WITH A \$500,000 SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT

In March 1968, Richard Hansell returned home from Vietnam and decided to attend college using his G.I. benefits. He had a mother and a mentally challenged older sister to care for, and thought that he would attend college and work part time. Unfortunately, there was a strike at the College that year. Unable to afford a more expensive college, he chose to work instead. Fast forward nearly 20 years later, Richard enrolled at the College in 1986 as a part-time Physical Science major, graduating in 1994.

After 25 years of service with the Philadelphia Police Department as a forensic scientist, specializing in latent fingerprints, Richard retired. He soon moved out west, where he joined another police department as a latent fingerprint examiner until officially retiring in 2004.

Grateful for his educational experience at Community College of Philadelphia, Richard has designated a \$500,000 estate gift to establish and endow the Richard Hansell Scholarship. Ultimately, Richard's gift will support students who have an interest in taking coursework leading to a career in the field of forensics. The Richard Hansell Scholarship Endowment will honor the memory of the students of Thomas A. Edison High School who lost their lives in military combat in the Vietnam conflict.

DR. DOUGLAS A. WHYTE - A TRIBUTE TO A MAN WHO ALWAYS PUT STUDENTS FIRST

Dr. Douglas A. Whyte (1936–2014) was a professor of Human Services at Community College of Philadelphia for 33 years. He was a driving force, developing and leading the department of Behavioral Health and Human Services from its early days through several major changes to the department it is today. He was an ardent advocate for the College and his area of expertise, having served as president of the Mid-Atlantic Consortium for Human Services and as a member of the National Organization for Human Services Education.

He was a Lindback Award winner in 1981 and department head for many years. Having no children of his own, his students became his family, and he was always willing to provide mentorship and counsel. Doug's compassion, devotion and generosity led him to leave a legacy gift to continue the support he had always given students.

Dr. Whyte also supported his community and was active in Big Brothers Big Sisters, Meals for the Homeless in Delaware County, a study group within the Delaware Prisons and Media Friends Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends. We applaud his service to Community College of Philadelphia and recognize him for his generosity and dedication to student success.


FISCAL YEAR 2017-18 FUNDRAISING RESULTS

(Total cash, pledges, non-government grants and sponsorships during fiscal year 2018 – July 1, 2017 - June 30, 2018)


SOURCES OF SUPPORT

Receipts of new cash, pledges, non-government grants and sponsorships during fiscal year 2018




USES OF SUPPORT

FOUR-YEAR FUNDRAISING COMPARISON — DOLLARS


(Total new cash, pledges, non-government grants and sponsorships)

NEW FUNDRAISING INITIATIVE

Under the leadership of new Foundation Board President Ellyn Jo Waller, Ed.D., First Lady of Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church, the College Foundation is exploring fundraising initiatives to maximize student success. The fundraising is organized around Building Philadelphia's Future and is guided by Impact 2025, the College's strategic plan, and the goals of the College's Facilities Master Plan.

The guiding principles of Impact 2025 support student success and increase the visibility and availability of the College as a cornerstone institution for Philadelphia.

Already the College has made progress toward this vision. Chemistry and biology labs have been renovated to support undergraduate research and experiential learning. Partnerships continue to be expanded with four-year educational institutions and with employers across the region.
